## William Albert "WA" Bauswell

Fraud Uncovered! - 100+ year old alias with a fake family

My Great Grandparents, Albert William Bauswell (1841-1911) and Ellen Jenkins-Bauswell (1847-1937) lived in Kansas City, Kansas and had four sons and one daughter. One of their sons, John Henry Bauswell (1871-1921) and his wife, Mary Lindsey-Bauswell (1877-1935) moved their family from Kansas City to San Francisco about 1906. This story is about one of John Henry and Mary's sons - William Henry "Buck" Bauswell.

A few years ago, a new Bauswell associated document became available for research on Ancestry.com and reported to me as a **hint**:

U.S., Northern Pacific Railway Company Personnel Files, 1890-1963.

This document immediately caught my attention in that it seemed to indicate a new member of the Kansas City Bauswell family - William Albert Bauswell. However, this William Albert Bauswell was reported to have been born in 1890, in Kansas City, Missouri.

The document was a multi-page Northern Pacific Railroad Company employment record that included the name of a wife, Addeline, and two daughters, Betty (age 3) and Ester (age 18 months).

Here are some relevant snippets from the Northern Pacific employment record:

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In order that the N. P. Ry. Co. may be fully informed as to my personal character and my qualifications for the position for which I have made application, I refer to each of my former employers, and request and authorize each of the said Companies for whom I have formerly worked, to give to the above named Company all information they may be in possession of, whether shown by my personal record or otherwise, as to my personal character and also my qualifications for the position I have herein applied for, and the reason why I was discharged or quit service, upon any inquiry that may be made of them, or either of them by said Northern Pacific Railway Company.

The document was confusing in that there already was a William Albert Bauswell (1877-1934). He was another son of Albert and Ellen Bauswell and brother of John Henry Bauswell. William Albert Bauswell lived out his life in Kansas City as a police officer.

I set about researching this, previously unknown WIlliam Albert Bauswell, his wife, Addeline, and children, Betty and Ester, to see where he and they fit into the Bauswell family. I spent many hours going down research trails that lead nowhere. I left the research and returned to it periodically, thinking that perhaps Ancestry.com or other sources would reveal a new key document. That never happened.


Ultimately, I was unable to find any documentation that supported that these people ever existed. It then became clear that this was likely a fraud. Someone invented and used an alias (and alias family) on that railroad personnel document. The next question was; who was the perpetrator?

My attention turned to John Henry Bauswell (1871-1921). As previously stated, he moved his family from Kansas City to San Francisco in about 1906. He had a son, William Henry "Buck" Bauswell (1898-1958). Knowing that Buck had a penchant to stretch the truth (e.g., date of birth, location of birth, physical traits), I focused on him. Buck left two telltale clues:

Clue 1) The date of birth of the fake William Albert Bauswell was Feb 24, 1890. Checking, I found the date of birth for Buck's Grandfather, Albert William Bauswell, was Feb 24, 1841. [Note: It's interesting that Buck twisted his grandfather's name for his alias and that he knew the month and day he was born.]

**Clue 2**) I checked three official document signatures for similarities; WW1 Draft Registration, Northern Pacific Railroad

Personnel Document, WW2 Draft Registration. These signatures were obviously from the same hand.

Clearly, 'Buck' Bauswell invented William Albert Bauswell (b. 1890) and the associated family, and used that alias in Aug, 1923 to apply for a job with the Northern Pacific Railroad. Why he did this we may never know. He worked as a Brakeman for the Northern Pacific from Aug, 1923 to Dec,1923, then resigned. He seems to have gotten married in early 1923 to a Martha Weales. Perhaps he was running away from that marriage? He returned to San Francisco, marrying again in 1932, and lived the rest of his life there, fathering two sons.

I'm sure he never considered that we would be able to solve this mystery and unravel a fraud perpetrated 100 years later.

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
