# **Anchors Aweigh - the Naval Career of John Baldwin**

In this story, the second of two parts, we will set sail on the nearly 20 year naval career odyssey of John "Johnny" Baldwin. We will use official US Navy documents to chronologically examine his multiple tours of duty, year by year, onshore and offshore. Along the way, we will get to know this man, who joined the US Navy at the tender age of 16.

## **Principal**

## Introduction - John "Johnny" Baldwin

In the first part of this two part story, "Dearest Dorothy - the Love Letters of Johnny Baldwin", we learned that John Baldwin (no middle name) (the author's paternal uncle) was the fifth child (fourth son) of William M Baldwin (1876-1943) and Delcie Hunt-Baldwin (1878-1945). We also discovered that between June 1939 and May 1940, with World War II looming, Naval Signalman, John "Johnny" Baldwin carried on a long distance letter writing courtship with Dorothy Lee Dixon. In all, 35 letters were sent to Dorothy. Before they married in May 1940, they had only met twice.

In that story, we found that, due to incomplete and/or missing information, details about his life in the US Navy were sometimes subject to speculation and interpretation. Now, because the author obtained John Baldwin's complete US Navy records from the US National Archives, we have the unique opportunity to fully reassemble his US Navy career, year by year. There are surprises and revelations and "Aha Moments". Let's get started.

#### 1925

Family lore was that John left home at the age of 15 to join the US Merchant Marines or the US Navy. We now know, based on his actual Oct. 1925 enlistment document, that he was barely 16, posing as a 19 year old. His actual birthdate was Sep 21 1909.

As can be seen, he enlisted at Ashland, KY, just across the Ohio River from Ironton, OH, on Oct. 23 1925. He was posing as a 19 year old adult, when, in fact, he was a 16 year old minor. It's likely, his parents knew nothing of his whereabouts or that he was enlisting in the US Navy. His brother, Roscoe Baldwin, had joined the US Navy in 1919. Roscoe must have had an influence on John's Navv enlistment decision.

Interestingly, his enlistment application includes a separate medical examination page. This page was left blank but signed by a *Lt. A.A. Shadday*, Medical Examiner. On the line where the examiner signs as "Accepted - Yes / No", "No" is scratched out and "Yes" inserted. What was

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going on there is unclear. However, aside from the fact that he was 6 foot tall, any reasonable medical examination would have quickly revealed that John Baldwin was NOT 19 years old. John maintained the false birthdate of Sep. 21 1909 throughout his Navy career.

John was first sent to an enlistment centre in Cincinnati, OH for processing then transferred to the Great Lakes Training Center in Illinois (Chicago) for basic training as an Apprentice Seaman. Coincidentally, we know that, in 1925, Roscoe Baldwin was stationed at the Great Lakes Training Center. Roscoe's role in John's naval career may be underestimated.

#### 1926

Upon graduation from US Navy basic training, John requested and was granted 10 days leave on Jan. 15 1926. On this leave, he travelled home to Kitts Hill, OH. Upon his return from leave he was assigned to the destroyer, USS *Kane* (235). At this time the

Kane was operating along the east coast of the United States and in the Caribbean. John's rating was upgraded in Feb. from Apprentice Seaman to Seaman Second Class, and in Aug. to Seaman First Class. He took 17 days leave in May. In Oct. John qualified as a 1st class swimmer and a marksman on a rifle course.



#### 1927

In Apr. 1927, John's rating changed from Seaman First Class to Signalman Third Class. This, to fill a vacancy following his qualification for the rating per examination. On July 1 1927 John was transferred from the USS *Kane* to the US Naval Hospital, Brooklyn, NY for "treatment". There was no indication in the records of the type of ailment being treated. However, it must have been serious, perhaps even life threatening, since he spent the next two months hospitalised (see 1931 below).


On Sep. 9 he was cleared for duty and was transferred back to the USS *Kane*, where he remained until Nov. 1927. At that time, he was transferred to the USS *Hopkins* (249), another destroyer. This ship also operated along the east coast; New England ports in the summer and Charleston, SC in the winter.



#### 1928

1928 would prove to be a momentous and life changing year for John Baldwin. The records for this year are numerous and detailed. There's a lot to unpack. Let's see what happened.

On or about Oct. 23 1928, John was granted ship liberty from the USS Hopkins, which was in port at Charleston, SC. He did not return from liberty and, 10 days later, was declared a Deserter. A 'Declaration and Reward for Deserter From U.S. Naval Service" was sent out. The reward was set at \$50 for his



apprehension. The Declaration included a full physical description, including his fingerprints and specific placement of "Rising Sun" tattoo on his right arm. His commanding officer aboard the USS *Hopkins*,

R. B. Hammes, filed the following report:

It's interesting that his personal belongings onboard the ship were auctioned off - presumably to his shipmates. And, his next of kin were notified. Thus, if John's parents did not before know he was in the Navy, they did now.

John's desertion set in motion all manner of US Navy dispatches and reports, all filed according to the <u>US Navy Bureau of Navigation Manual</u> - then responsible for enlisted personnel matters.

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
The incident ended on Nov. 5 1928 when John surrendered at Cincinnati, OH - at the Navy Recruitment Station where he enlisted three years earlier. In this regard, the following radiogram was sent:

John was confined to a county jail awaiting further instructions. Instructions received on Nov. 7 were to transport John to the Naval Training Station Great Lakes - where John took his basic training. A 'Report of Return of Deserter' was filed:

The good news here is that on Nov. 16 1928, the US Navy Bureau of Navigation determined that John was AWOL, <u>NOT a Deserter</u> - an important distinction. He was, however, to be tried in Summary Court-Martial on Nov. 22 1928.



He was found guilty and sentenced to be confined for a period of 25 days, commencing Nov. 23 1928, and lose \$30 per month of his pay for a period four months. It does not appear that his Navy rating was reduced.

He served his sentence at the Naval Training Station Great Lakes, IL. It's likely that his brother, Roscoe (stationed there), visited him while he was in confinement. John was released on Dec. 27 and transferred to the Navy Shipyard Receiving Barracks, Philadelphia, PA for assignment.

The 1928 'AWOL for ten days' conviction was a permanent blemish on John's US Navy career record. It remained there until his retirement.


We will never know what motivated John to go AWOL. He obviously went back home to Kitts Hill. It's likely that his parents, and perhaps his brother Roscoe, convinced him to surrender, take his punishment, and remain in the Navy - which he did. He was now 19 and perhaps this was a strong lesson for him in life management, personal responsibilities, and consequences.

As of January. 1 1929, John was assigned from the Receiving Barracks at the Philadelphia, PA Navy Yard to the USS *Contocook* (36; left in photo). His rating was listed as Signalman Third Class.

The Contocook served the fleet along the Atlantic coast and in the Caribbean. She towed floating equipment, escorted submarines, towed target rafts, brought disabled ships into port, and carried ammunition, stores, light freight, and passengers between east coast shipyards and to the fleet.



At the end of Mar. 1929, John's record cleared such that he was able to again receive pay. His conduct was rated as high. On Oct. 22 he was discharged Honourably, having completed four years of service (minus the 10 days for AWOL), at the Navy Yard, Norfolk, VA. He was issued an Honorable Discharge Certificate and Button and travel allowance to Ashland, KY. His discharge record stated the following:

- 1. Recommended for reenlistment, Yes
- 2. Recommended for Good Conduct Medal, Yes

On Nov. 4 1929, John again applied for enlistment in the US Navy, this time in Cleveland, OH. On this application he continued to maintain that his birthdate was Sep. 21 1906, making him 23 years old - he was actually 20. He was honest about the AWOL and being in jail. And, he had a full physical this time. His stated reason for enlistment was "like service".

Upon reenlistment, he was transferred to the Navy Yard at Philadelphia, PA for assignment. While there, he requested and was approved for "...transferred to Asiatic Station, for duty".



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On Dec. 12 1929 John was transferred to San Francisco, CA via the USS <u>Chaumont</u> (AP-5) to join the Asiatic Fleet. The <u>Chaumont</u> was a troop ship. Thus, it's likely that John, while being transferred to San Francisco, traveled through the Panama Canal from the Atlantic side to the Pacific side. He was onboard the Chaumont until Feb. 1930.







#### 1930

After sailing from the Navy Yard at Philadelphia, PA to the Navy Station at San Francisco for nearly two months, John was transferred from the troop ship, USS *Chaumont* (AP-5), to the destroyer USS *Stewart* (224), on Feb. 8, 1930.





John was stationed on the USS Stewart for almost two years, until Dec. 1931. The Stewart had a storied history. Built in 1919, she served with Asiatic Fleet beginning in 1922, primarily operating in Chinese waters. Scuttled in port at Surabaya, Java, in 1942, she was later raised by the Japanese and commissioned as Patrol Boat No. 102. She came back under American control in 1945 after the occupation of Japan.

While onboard the USS Stewart, John successfully completed the education course work to advance to Signalman Second Class in May 1930. As a result, his rating was changed accordingly. According to ship records, his professional work and personal conduct were reported to be exceptional.

#### 1931

On Jun. 5 1931, while onboard the USS Stewart, John was awarded the 2nd Nicaraguan Campaign Medal. This, for duty onboard the USS Kane, Apr. to Jun. 1927.

The Second Nicaraguan Campaign Medal was awarded for service during operations in Nicaragua from 1926 to 1933, during the Nicaraguan civil war and the subsequent occupation. An earlier campaign medal, the Nicaraguan Campaign Medal, was awarded for service in Nicaragua 1912.

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The awarding of this medal, with its associated 1927 participation timeline, is, coincidentally, a month before John landed in a Navy hospital in Brooklyn, NY for two months (see 1927 above). Did John contract some sort of tropical disease while on duty with USS *Kane* in Nicaraguan waters in the Spring of 1927? It seems highly probable.

On Dec. 4 1931, John was transferred from the USS *Stewart* to the USS *Borie* (215). The *Borie* was another destroyer in the Asiatic Fleet. She too had a storied battle history.


During WW2, in the North Atlantic, the USS *Borie* got into a pitched battle with several German submarines. The battle was long and arduous with the *Borie* ramming submarine and then getting stuck on the top of the submarine. The story is too long to recount here, but is well worth examination.

The *Borie* received three battle stars for her World War II service as well as the Presidential Unit Citation. *Borie* crew members were awarded three Navy Cross medals, two Silver Star medals and one Legion of Merit medal.

Not long after his transfer to the USS *Borie*, John requested and was approved for transfer to the USS *Canapus* (AS-9). His stated reason for transferring was that he had served for the past six years on destroyers and desired a change of duty. For this change, John had to agree to extend his Asiatic Station for one year.

The *Canopus* was a submarine tender with an assigned squadron of six submarines.

On Sep. 18 1932, John was reprimanded for a curfew violation in Tsingtao, China. As a result, he was deprived of Shore Leave for a period of two months.


Though no specific 1932 date was registered, John was awarded the Yangtze Service Medal for service onboard the USS *Stewart*, USS *Borie* and USS *Canopus*.

The Yangtze Service Medal was awarded for service in the Yangtze River Valley between Sep. 3 1926 and Dec. 31 1932, a period of significant unrest in the region.



On Oct. 28 1932, John was transferred from the USS *Canopus* to the

USS *Pigeon* (ASR-6). The *Pigeon* was first launched as a minesweeper and later converted to be a submarine rescue ship. John would be stationed on the *Pigeon* for the next six years.


In Feb., onboard the USS *Pigeon*, John qualified in swimming and then qualified as a sharpshooter (this, at the William McKinley Rifle Range, Manila, P.I.).

On May 10, John was admonished and punished for being "non-cooperative in medical treatment". Knowing, from later records yet to be reviewed here, that John had contracted syphilis in 1931, this medical procedure may have been related to ongoing treatment. At this time, arsenic, in combination with bismuth or mercury, was the mainstay of treatment for syphilis until the advent of penicillin in 1943. One can only imagine how this toxic chemical cocktail was administered.

In Sep., John successfully completed the Navy training course for Signalman First Class; average 3.52. Passing the course did not result an an automatic rating upgrade. But, a promotion could now be expected.

On Nov. 3, John, upon expiration of his enlistment, was Honourably Discharged. On Nov. 4 1933, John reenlisted onboard the USS *Pigeon* for another four years of service. And, he agreed to extend his Asiatic Station duty one more year.

On Jan. 8 1934, John was awarded a Continuous Service Certificate (actually received on Feb. 13). This, for completing eight years of Naval Service, as of Nov. 1933.

On Jun. 5, John was admonished for being AWOL 4.5 hours. The punishment was three weeks restrictions.

For some mysterious reason, in Jun. 1934, John's job changed from Signalman to Mail Clerk. This, in accordance with a Navy Dispatch.

On Aug. 3, John actually took possession the Yangtze Service Medal that he had been awarded in 1932.

August, 1934 - Designated as Navy Mail Clerk for USS PIGEON effective from 28 June, 1934 in accordance wit Bu.Nav.Despatch 6307-1600 of July, 1934 and J.A.G.of the Navy's letter MM-Baldwin, John/Ll3-1(340512) dated 27 June, 1934. Credited with extra compensation of \$15.00 per month in accordance with Art.D-5307 Bu.Nav. Manual, 1925. Approved allowance 5 Officers and 61 enlisted men.  J.A.Hollowell, Lieutenant, U.S. Navy, Commanding.

Let's take moment to reflect on John's ten years in the US Navy; 1925 to 1935. Recall that he joined when he was barely 16 years old; Oct 1925. Now, he was 26. This, though he continued to maintain with Navy official records that he was born in 1909 instead of 1906. Essentially, John came of age on ships exclusively populated by men. How this fact affected his social skills with women, or men for that matter, is unknown.

Let's examine his signatures, about ten years apart. In the first (leftmost), 1925, you sense a shaky and somewhat insecure young man. In the second (rightmost), 1936, you can visualize a matured man who has grown in confidence and swagger.


The only documents we have for 1935 are two "Report of Examination for Advancement in Rating". They seem to be almost identical; exams for rating of Signalman First Class. The first was in Feb. 1935; average @ 3.64. The second was completed in Oct. 1935; average 3.72. Knowing that in Sep. 1933, John also passed the same examination; average 3.52, this would be the third examination for Signalman First Class. Surely, by this time he would have had the exam memorised. It may be that he was trying to get back to being a Signalman instead of Mail Clerk.

Regardless, it would another year, and yet one more (4th) exam, before John would be advanced to the Signalman First Class Rating.

#### 1936

In Feb. 1936, John signed yet another Asiatic Station one year extension; expiring Aug. 1937.

In Apr. a dispatch was was received by the USS *Pigeon* with a summary of John's Navy Service, to date - for what purpose is unknown. Perhaps the captain of the USS *Pigeon*, or a senior officer, requested his records ahead of a possible rating advancement.



In Oct. 1936, John, for the 4th time, took the exam for rating of SM1c (Signalman First Class). This time his average mark was 3.67. With successful completion of this exam, there was an endorsement added to promote John to Signalman First Class as of Nov. 11 1936.

Additionally, in Aug., as a member of the USS *Pigeon* communication team during, what seemed to be a fleet completion of some sort - 2nd place in Group Four - he was entitled to wear a red "E" on his uniform.

So, all in all, 1936 was a pretty good year in the Navy for John "Johnny" Baldwin.

Apparently, the USS *Pigeon* placed 1st in the Group Four fleet communications competition. So, John was entitled to \$10 in prize money and to wear the white "E" on his his service uniform.

John's four year enlistment terminated on Nov. 3 1937 and he was granted another Honourable Discharge. And, on Nov. 4, he once again reenlisted for another four years. He was retained onboard the USS *Pigeon* for duty. He had now completed 12 years of service.





1938 would a year of change for John. He would leave Asiatic Station duty for the continental US. His goal was to be on shore duty stationed either in the Ninth Naval District (Great Lakes region) or the Fourth Naval District (Philadelphia, PA region).


The first document we have is one that proclaims that John qualified as a "Shell Back", by crossing the equator southbound at the 119th Meridian East on Apr. 30 1938.






We also see on this document that John, in Aug., completed the education courses for the Quartermaster First Class (QM1c) and the Chief Quartermaster (CQM). Chief Quartermaster was his next rating goal.

In Sep. the USS *Pigeon* once again placed first in the Group Four fleet communication competition. Again, John received a \$10 prize and was entitled to wear the white "E" on his service uniform.





On Oct. 15 1938, John formally requested to be transferred from ship duty to shore duty, effective as soon as possible. He had served at sea for almost 13 years and was entitled to a change of duty.

Per above, his original request was to be transferred either to the Great Lakes Base, where is his brother, Roscoe Baldwin, was stationed, or to the Naval Base at Philadelphia, PA. This was not to be as we will soon see. However, the shore duty request was approved and he was transferred from the USS *Pigeon* to the USS *Chaumont* for transportation to the United States on Oct. 29 1938.

On Dec. 21 1938, John arrived in San Francisco onboard the USS *Chaumont*. He was then transferred to the USS *Tennessee* (BB-43). On Jan. 24 1939 the *Tennessee* delivered John to his next duty ship, the USS *Louisville* (CA-28 - see right).

The USS Louisville was classified as a Heavy Cruiser.



During the winter months of 1939 the *Louisville* participated in fleet exercises in the Caribbean. She operated in these waters until May, when she returned to the west coast. Presumably, during this tour, John was on duty as a Signalman, not a Mail Clerk.

In Apr. 1939, John was recommended for examination for Chief Quartermaster.


According to several sources, Navy Quartermasters: "... specializes in navigation, with a focus on mapping and charts, as well as using electronic navigation systems. They work as assistants to the Officers of the Deck and the navigator. They may perform ship control as helmsman, or serve watch on the bridge. They maintain the ship's Deck Log, plot the ship's position on charts, and maintain dead-reckoning of the ship's position. It's a position with a lot of responsibility."


On Jun. 6, John was arrested by civil authorities in civilian clothes, turned over to Naval Patrol, and charged with "intoxication". Punishment was one week's deprivation of liberty.

On Jun. 11 1939, while stationed on the *Louisville*, John began a letter writing campaign with his future wife, Dorothy Dixon, then living in Los Angeles. In all, between Jun. 1939 and May 1940, John wrote 35 letters to Dorothy. They are all part of the companion story: "Dearest Dorothy - the Love Letters of Johnny Baldwin".

In the middle of Aug. 1939, John received new orders from Fleet Command that he would be transferred from the USS *Louisville* to the Fleet Radio Base, San Clemente Island for permanent duty.

Thusly, with a series of ship transfers, John was delivered to San Clemente Island on Aug. 29 1939.





Later that year, on San Clemente Island, John took the exam for Chief Quartermaster (CQM). There is a document stating this occurred, but no exact exam date was indicated.


#### 1940


John "Johnny" Baldwin married Dorothy Dixon on May 11, 1940 in Yuma, AZ.

On Jun. 27 1940, new orders fulfilling his 1938 request for shore duty in the Fourth Naval District were received; Inshore Patrol Base, Cape May, NJ. However, these orders were cancelled, presumably because he was now married, changing his priorities.

On Aug. 5, John was recommended for appointment to Warrant Grade Boatswain. A Boatswain is: "A warrant officer or petty officer in charge of a ship's rigging, anchors, cables, and deck crew." Basically, a ship's deck boss.

On Dec. 18 1940 John was transferred from San Clemente Island, to the Naval Net Depot, Tiburon, CA. He would travel there by private car, with his new wife.





John's good marks on his Chief Quartermaster (CQM) exam in 1939 was rewarded on Feb. 28 1941 when his rating was upgraded to CQM (temporary).

On Nov. 3 1941, and like we have seen numerous times before, John's enlistment expired with an Honourable Discharge. Then, the next day, he once again reenlisted - for another, and final, four years - with a CQM rating.

It's important to take note that with this enlistment he would be able to transfer to Fleet Reserve (leaving active duty) after two years; Nov. 1943. And, we see he now has 16 years of net US Navy active service.

These next two years were to be life changing in a big way for John. The official Navy documents for this period are detailed and numerous. I will do my best to summarise what happened and include relevant documents and document snippets. Let's get started.

John's shore duty at the US Naval Net Depot, Tiburon, CA was short lived. On May 21 1942 he was again onboard ship. This time he was assigned to the USS *Catalpa* (AN-10/YN-5). John, as of Apr. 1 1942, was made a permanent rating of Chief Quartermaster (CQM).



The USS *Catalpa's* main role was to serve the U.S. Navy ships and harbors during World War II with her protective anti-submarine nets. After loading equipment at the Net Depot at Tiburon, California, *Catalpa* sailed 24 May 1942 for the Fiji Islands, arriving 14 June. At Nandi, Suva, and during October and November 1942 at Funafuti in the Ellice Islands, *Catalpa* laid and cared for harbor entrance nets, protecting important South Pacific Ocean bases.

In Jul. 1942, by order of the President, John was appointed to the rating of Boatswain (temporary), recognised officially on the *Catalpa* on Sep. 29.

Apparently, in order to be appointed to the Boatswain rating (permanent), a physical had to be completed. This was done to insure the sailor was capable of the Boatswain's strenuous deck duties. So, on Nov. 5 1942 he went ashore to Advance Base Fan Tan One (WW2 Code name for the Fiji Islands) for a medical exam. Other than missing five teeth and the statement that he had been infected with Syphilis in 1931, the exam was normal and John was "qualified for all duty", and, thusly, appointed to the Warrant rank of Boatswain. The medical report was forwarded to Washington DC, Chief of the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery.



On Nov. 30, the Chief of the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery sent the following letter:

WASHINGTON, D. C.

November 30, 1942

From: To: The Chief of the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery. The Chief of Naval Personnel.

Subject:

Physical fitness in the case of John PALLWIN, CLM(PA), USM., for temporary appointment to warrant rank.

1. The subject named enlisted man was examined in the field on November 5, 1942 and reported physically qualified for temporary appointment to warrant rank with a history of Syphilis, 1931. The medical examiner reported negative serological tests during the past 5 years, but failed to give complete details as required in paragraph 1507, Manual of the Medical Department, as revised by Bumas Form Letter No. 33 dated March 17, 1942.

- 2. It is therefore requested that he be re-examined by a regular Board of Medical Examiners and that this Board be directed to submit a report of physical examination including laboratory details of blood and cerebrospinal fluid examination made at the present time, with their report on MMS Form Y.
- The report of physical examination conducted in the fiels on November 5, 1942 has been retained in the files of this Bureau.

John had to be reexamined because the Nov. 5 medical examiner had failed to give complete details about the Syphilis serological tests as required by the Medical Department. This apparent error or laboratory incapacity resulted in John being disqualified for the Warrant Grade of Boatswain until such time of full compliance with serological testing reporting requirements.

Meanwhile, John's commanding officer, Francis A. Gherini, wanted to promote Boatswain John Baldwin to Ensign John Baldwin.

"An Ensign in the Navy is the lowest commissioned officer rank, typically responsible for leading a division and undergoing training. In the US Navy, it is equivalent to a second lieutenant in other branches of the military."

Now, for me, the fact that John's commanding officer would recommend that an enlisted man be promoted to the officer ranks, is quite remarkable. I did a little background checking on Francis A Gherini. Turns out, he too has story. Let's take a moment to reflect on the life of this gentleman.


1. In accordance with reference (a) it is recommended that the subject named man be advanced from the grade of Boatswain to the rank of Ensign.

2. Since this officer has been attached to this command he has evidenced such a degree of loyality - both to the men under him and to officers over him - as to be of the highest order. His character and integrity are of a caliber which leave little to be desired. He is possessed of all the necessary professional qualifications incident to the rank of ensign and it is emphatically believed that he will continue to be a credit to the navy he served so valiantly for 18 years.

#### Francis Gherini; Sued U.S. Over Ranch

Francis Gherini, 84, who fought and won a battle with the federal government after it seized his Santa Cruz Island ranchland for a park. Gherini, who was born in San Francisco and lived in Ventura was the patriarch of a family that since 1880 had owned thousands of acres of land on Santa Cruz Island, one of the Channel Islands off the Ventura County coast. A lawyer who specialized in immigration issues, Gherini was for a decade the only attorney in the county to speak Spanish, family members told The Times. His battle with the National Park Service started in 1997 after the service condemned and seized his 6,200 acres on the island. The park service offered to pay him \$4 million for the property but Gherini considered that a paltry sum and decided to sue. This February, after a three-week trial, a jury awarded him \$12.7 million. But his health had been in decline of late. Gherini had a quadruple bypass late last year and was also required to undergo dialysis three times a week. On Tuesday from a head injury he sustained after collapsing in the driveway of his daughter's home.


GHERINI, Francis, 84, passed away in Pasadena, California April 28th, 1999, after suffering a cerebral hemorrhage. Born in San Francisco, he grew up in Hillsborough, and graduated from the University of California at Berkeley and Stanford Law School.

He is survived by the love of his life, his wife of 57 years. Inez and his children Denny, Cathi Beauclair (John), and Andrea Gherini Gallant (Brad), his grandchildren Frank (Angie), Eric, Charlotte, John, Jennifer, Nicole, Chelsea and Patrick, and his sisters Marie Ringrose and Ilda McGinness, both

Ringrose and Ilda McGinness, both of San Francisco.

During WWII he served as a US Naval Commander in the Pacific Theater. After discharge he set his law practice in Oxnard, and practiced for nearly 50 years in Ventura County. He served as president of the Oxnard Rotary Club, and was a member of the Knights of Columbus. He was a fourth generation Californian whose great grandfather, San Francisco businessman Justinian Caire, acquired Santa Cruz Island in 1869. Francis continued ranching operations there until the National Park Service acquired his land in 1997. Francis was a long-standing member of the Adolfo camp of Rancheros Vistadores. His friends on Rancheros all considered him a good and decent man, valued as an articulate and witty communicator with a keen sense of humor. He cherished many great friendships and had great stories to tell from his Rancheros rides.

Back to John - But, none of this was to be; no permanent Boatswain rating, no Ensign promotion to the officer ranks. On Dec. 28 1942, John "Johnny" Baldwin's Navy career was about to come to an abrupt termination.




#### 1943

On Jan. 5 1943, John was transferred by the USS *Wright* from the Naval Dispensary on Fiji to the US Naval Hospital at San Diego for an "indefinite" hospital stay.

On Feb. 5 he was detached from any and all active duty assignments so that hospital treatments could continue.

A Report of Medical Survey was filed on Apr. 6 1943. In it was a statement that John had been admitted to the sick list onboard the USS *Catalpa* for swelling of both legs, both ankles and feet for three weeks. Urinalysis revealed persistently high albuminuria. After rest and a regulated diet, the swelling subsided and the John felt quite well. It was recommended that further treatment would be necessary.



The diagnosis of the Apr. 6 Medical Survey was: Nephritus, Acute.

#### What is Nephritis?

"Nephritis occurs when parts of your kidney become inflamed (swollen). This swelling prevents the kidney from working properly to filter waste from the blood. Nephritis can be caused by infection, autoimmune or inflammatory conditions such as lupus, genetic disorders, or other conditions."

#### What causes Nephritis?

- Allergic reaction to a medication.
- Autoimmune disorders, such as lupus.
- Bacterial infection, usually starting in the bladder.
- High calcium or uric acid levels in your blood.
- Kidney stones.
- Long-term use of certain medications.
- Low potassium levels in your blood.
- Medication side effects.
- Surgery on your urinary tract.


On Jul. 3 1943 another Report of Medical Survey was conducted. In it, the diagnosis was changed from Nephritis, Acute to Nephritis, Chronic, by reason of sequela. Sequela is defined as "a condition which is the consequence of a previous disease or injury".

In this case, the Medical Survey states: "Disability is <u>not</u> the result of his own misconduct and <u>was</u> incurred in line of duty". So, somewhere, somehow, John contracted a disease or infection that resulted in the onset of Nephritis. Knowing that John was in a US Navy hospital in Brooklyn, NY for two months; from Jul. to Sep. 1927, one is left to speculate its relevance to the Nephritis diagnosis.

The Jul. 3 Medical Survey stated John was Fit for Duty; limited to duty ashore commensurate with his physical disability.

On Jul. 7 1943, the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery Disapproved of the Jul. 3 recommendation.

Instead, it recommended that John be ordered to appear before a **Naval Retiring Board**.



The wheels of the US Navy personnel machine were now in motion. A series of legal actions took place over the course of the next few weeks that ultimately placed John Baldwin on a Navy "Retired List" and forced him to civilian life.

Nov. 11 1943

John was placed on a US Navy Retired List as of Nov. 1 1943, with the rating of Boatswain.

He was wished "... many years of happiness".

Dec. 1 1943

1. The Naval Retiring Board before which you appeared on 27 August 1943, decided that you are incapacitated for active service by reason of physical disability; that your incapacity is permanent, is the result of an incident of the service, and was incurred subsequent to 23 July 1942, the date you were appointed by the President a Boatswain for temporary service.


2. The President of the United States on 28 October 1943 approved the proceedings and findings of the Naval Retiring Board.

3. Accordingly, you were placed on the retired list on 1 Movember 1943, in the rank of Boatswain, with retired pay at the rate of 75 per centum of the active duty pay to which you were entitled while serving in that rank, pursuant of the provisions of section 8 (a) of the Act of Congress approved 24 July 1941, (U.S. Code, Title 34, sections 417 and 350g(a).

4. The Secretary of the Navy regrets that your disability has interrupted your service on the active list of the Navy and wishes you many years of happiness.

- 3. On Aug. 24 1948, John reported his address as 8444 Beechwood Ave., South Gate, CA.
- 4. On Nov. 27 1948, John reported his address as 10942 S. Arlington, Los Angeles, CA.
- 5. On May 4 1949 and Nov. 22 1952, John reported his address as 10942 S Van Ness, Los Angeles, CA.

On May 13 1957, John reported a "Record of Emergency Data". On this document are two distinctive details of interest.

**Detail One**: His Date of Birth is reported, for the first time, as <u>Sep. 21 1909</u>, not <u>Sep. 21 1906</u> as he reported all through his active Navy career.

**Detail Two**: His rank is now reported as <u>Chief Boatswain</u>, <u>Grade CW02</u>. Somewhere along the line, after his active duty retirement, his Boatswain (temp) rating was upgraded. The CW02 designation indicates he was rated a Warrant Officer - **Chief Warrant Officer 2**.

A Chief Warrant Officer is the U.S. Navy's "entry-level billeted warrant officer rank. Warrant officers serve as technical specialists with command authority within their field of expertise and hold a variety of positions essential to the smooth operation of the Navy." They are officers ranked above all non-commissioned officers, but subordinate to the lowest officer grade.


How this advanced rating occurred is unclear. Apparently, not all documents related to John Baldwin's US Navy career were archived. It may be that John, following his active Navy retirement in 1943, was still an Inactive Navy Reservist until 1945. Subsequent to his initial 1943 retirement, his rating and grade must have been promoted. And, then there was this from 1958:
